#### Steps



Salted Caramel Toffee

Ingredients 5 apples 150g brown sugar 4tbsp golden syrup 1 tsp vanilla extract 1 tsp sea salt

### Bonfire Banoffee



ServeApples the wax and help the caramel to stick, remove with a slotted spoon, then wipe the skins with kitchen paper.

> **2.**Remove the stalks and pierce each apple with a lolly stick or wooden skewer. Put the apples in the fridge while you make the caramel

**3.**Line a baking tray with non - stick baking paper. Put the sugar into a large saucepan with the syrup, butter and vanilla. Heat slowly over a medium heat for around 8 mins, or until the sugar has dissolved.

**4.** Increase the heat, bringing the mixture to a rolling boil. Add a sugar thermometer and boil for around 8 mins or until the thermometer reaches 140°C 'hard crack' stage – if you don't have a thermometer you can test by spooning a little into a bowl of cold water; it should harden instantly and when removed, be brittle and easy to crack. Stir through the salt.

**5.**Remove the caramel from the heat. Submerge each apple into the caramel. Allow the coated apples to set for 1 hour before serving.

Hot Spiced Cider

### Ingredients

300g ginger nut biscuits 100g melted butter 5 bananas, peeled, sliced lengthways, then in half 1 x 397g tin caramel, such as Carnation 3 x 200g bag marshmallows

### Steps

Ingredients

2 cinnamon sticks 2 star anise

Serves

6

4 tbsp ginger syrup

1½ ltr vintage cider

1 orange, ½ juiced and ½ sliced

Prep 5 mins

Cook 10 mins

3 tbsp light soft brown sugar

#### Steps

4 cloves

**1.**Heat the vintage cider, cinnamon sticks, cloves and star anise in a large pan for a few mins, then add the ginger syrup, the orange juice and slices and the sugar.

**2.**Bring to the boil, then simmer for 5 mins. To serve, ladle into glasses and add an extra cinnamon stick stirrer, orange slice and star anise to each, if you like.

**1.**Line the base of a 21cm loose- bottomed tart tin (3½ cm deep) with non - stick baking paper. Blitz the biscuits in a food processor until they reach a fine crumb, mix with the melted butter and spoon into the tin. Use the back of a spoon to press the biscuits into the base and up the sides. Chill in the fridge for 30 mins. **2.**Lay the bananas on the base in an even layer. Spoon the caramel into a bowl, stir well until smooth, then pour evenly over the bananas, to the top of the biscuit case. Chill for 30 mins. **3.**Preheat the grill to high. Arrange the marshmallows on top, starting with an even layer all over, then pile up to 2 or 3 high in the centre (check how much room you have under the grill first). Grill for 15 secs, or until gooey and brown on top. Decorate with cake sparklers, if you like.

### Agricultural vehicles passing through Airmyn

Dear Editor,

I feel sure that I am not the only person living in this village who has become absolutely sick and tired of the ever-increasing numbers of very heavy tractors and trailers that are passing through Airmyn every day at high speed and at just about all hours of the day and night. I am not just fed up with them. I am worried sick about the detrimental effect that they are having on all the properties along the High Street. Our house frequently shakes when these vehicles are passing. It is held together with lime mortar and it was not built in anticipation of ever having to withstand the vibrations caused by these enormous farm vehicles passing by.

We should not have to endure this traffic and I want it stopping. These modern-day tractors and the trailers and other appliances that they are pulling are far, far heavier than the little grey Fergies and the Massey Fergies that we were happy to accept as a part of our lives many years ago. They are not only a threat to our properties; they are also a danger to us because they are being driven at speeds which are frequently and clearly above the 30 mph limit and they are being driven by youths who cannot possibly have the experience and the wisdom that is needed to drive safely and with appropriate consideration along a village street containing a lot of parked cars.

I don't know who owns all these tractors and trailers. I don't know where they are coming from or where they are going to but I do intend to find out. As far as I am concerned, if they are not coming through the village to work in one of the fields that lies on either side of the road between Boothferry Bridge and Glew's Garage, or, at a push, White City, which is in our parish, then they should not be coming into the village at all. They can go round by Goole along the A614, which is a road built to withstand their weight.

I have carried out four or five traffic counts in Airmyn in recent years and their results were all published in this newsletter. After the last one, two or three years ago, I said that I would not be doing any more because they had served their purpose, which was to find out how many vehicles were passing through the village each day and if their number was increasing, which it wasn't. Now, we have a changed situation. These farm vehicles were not present in anything like the numbers that they now are when I was doing those surveys. I propose therefore to do another couple of counts, confining myself this time to just these farm vehicles and details of what they are carrying through the village.

I would welcome help and support from anyone who feels as concerned as I do. There is a need to identify whose vehicles they are, why there are suddenly so many of them passing through each day and where they are going to or coming from.

The police also need to be consulted. There is a weight limit of 7.5 tonnes on vehicles which are allowed to pass through Airmyn. The reason for that limit being imposed was presumably because anything heavier was thought to impose a threat to the well-being of our properties. Don't agricultural vehicles heavier than 7.5 tonnes pose exactly the same threat? If so, why are they being allowed to pass through here when all other vehicles as heavy as them are banned? #### School Streets Volunteers



The school in partnership with East Riding of Yorkshire Council will soon be launching School Streets from Monday 2nd November, which is a pioneering scheme to transform the road outside our school, by restricting traffic. We are seeking volunteers to help support the School Streets pilot; to ensure our pupils and families have a safe, enjoyable experience when arriving and leaving our school. The success of School Streets depends on how quickly all of those who may be affected understand and accept the restrictions and how readily they adapt their behaviour. And that, in turn, depends considerably on the presence of volunteers who can explain what's going on and why, to anyone who asks in a friendly, polite and positive way. School Streets volunteers will play a key role in helping to communicate the wider benefits of School Streets not just to the school and pupils, but to the local community.

Volunteer support is absolutely critical and is particularly essential at the beginning of the pilot, as people who are used to being able to drive and/or park in the School Streets get used to discovering alternative routes, using the park and stride venues or change their travel habits altogether. Your role will help people to understand how they can help to keep the streets safer, reduce congestion and improving the environment around the school as well as supporting more sustainable ways to travel like walking, scooting and cycling.

The primarily role of a School Streets volunteer will inform drivers of the restriction and offering information and guidance, in particular, the location of the park and stride venues. The permanent signs, with details of the access restrictions times to the School Streets zone, will be installed at relevant places. Volunteers will need to explain the reasons for School Streets to passers-by and drivers from the footpath if asked. There will be a foldable information sign and cone to erect and pack away while the restrictions are in place in the morning and afternoon. Volunteers, may also need to assist vehicles which either have a permit or are on the exemption list on entering the School Streets zone during the restricted times with the local policing team offering support. If you are keen to help make this scheme a success and become a School Streets volunteer, please contact the school office by telephoning 01405 762086 or emailing airmynpark@airmynparkprimaryschool.co.uk to leave your contact details or for further information. Onsite training will take place shortly before the launch in line with current Covid-19 guidance in partnership with Humberside Police and East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

#### Services in St. David's church during November

Singing is still not permitted under these regulations but we are endeavouring to provide music via the church organ and CDs which will be appropriate for each occasion. Face masks must be worn all the time unless you are delivering a reading as a part of the service. Prayers will be offered for all those NHS employees who are on the front line attempting to save lives and to relieve suffering during this unprecedented pandemic.

#### Coming events:

The PCC meets on the 5<sup>th</sup> November and decisions will be made at this meeting about what kind of celebratory events and services we will be able to have to mark the Christian season of Christmas. Much of what we would normally do seems very much to be under the threat of not being able to take place this year, including some of our principal fund-raising events, but an outline of what is decided will be made known in next month' s 'Airmyn News' and, in more detailed form, in the church's own monthly magazine.

#### Sponsored walk:

Janet Rushby duly completed her trek around the Howdenshire '20' and raised over £2,000 for our church funds via her sponsors. This was a great effort and not the first time she has undertaken such a challenge but, like the rest of us, she is not getting any younger, so all the more reason for us all to say, 'Well done,' to her.

"I have been Churchwarden at St David's Church now for well over thirty years and over those years have done numerous sponsored walks to raise money for the church thanks to the folk of Airmyn. I recently walked the Howden Twenty as a sponsored event to raise much needed funds for the church, as the Covid 19 pandemic has put a stop to all fundraising events during the year. This walk was a twenty - mile circular route on public paths around Howden and the surrounding villages. The walk started and finished at the magnificent church of St Peter, otherwise known as Howden Minster, and took me nine and a half hours to complete. It was a lovely autumnal morning as I began the walk, which took me over the M62 motorway to Howdendyke and then along the banks of the River Ouse where I witnessed the passage of geese making their noisy morning journey eastwards. Later I was joined at Loftsome Bridge by Chris Spence my keep fit mate and long - time friend, I was pleased of her company as I enjoy walking and talking, it helps the miles along. The River Derwent was our companion most of the way to Bubwith where we joined the disused Market Weighton to Selby railway track, now a pleasant country trail to walk along. On reaching Bubwith Highfield we were joined by one of my Rambling colleagues and had a much needed lunch break. From there to Spaldington much of our walk was mainly on tarmac roads, which was easier to stride out on but harder on the feet which were beginning to ache somewhat. At Spaldington we parted company with Chris, who had walked a good ten miles. As Chris left us so did my map reading skills, we ended up crossing newly ploughed fields, climbing over barbed wire fencing and crossing a very steep sided dyke which fortunately was dry at the bottom. Until eventually we found our way onto a wide green lane and were on the correct route again, which brought us out onto the Howden to Bubwith road, just north of Howden Station. There my Rambling friend left me and I was joined with another friend from the Ramblers who kept me walking the final stage, through Brind, over the railway line and eventually through rows of newly planted trees then Howden Minster came into view. It was a further half hour before we reached the Market Cross and I was able to rest my weary body for a while. I could not have done this walk without my companions, and I am grateful to them all. I am also more than grateful to all the kind and generous people who sponsored me on this last venture, for your good wishes, encouragement and most of all for the money you so willingly donated to St David's Church. The final total raised was £2150, so again thanks to each and every one I say thank you, and thanks to God for my health and strength, I am richly blessed." lanet

# Emergency Funding

Emergency funding is available to residents in the East Riding whose income has been reduced as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic. The Government has made a limited amount of money available to help people with essential items, such as food an essential living items and it can be used to pay utility bills and some travel costs. The emergency assistance scheme can be accessed by who have had a reduction in income of at least 20% due to Coronavirus, and where there is no alternative means of meeting their financial need, including help from universal credit and other benefits.

Councillor Lyn Healing, portfolio holder for community involvement and council corporate services at East Riding of Yorkshire Council, said: "We understand that Covid-19 has had a considerable effect on peoples' finances and some people require urgent assistance to help with food and essentials in a time of crisis. The council already operates an emergency assistance scheme, where we support residents who have had an interruption to their income and need financial help. We have now been given funding from the Government to operate another similar scheme, specifically to help residents who have had a reduction in their income caused directly by Covid-19 and need help with food, gas and electricity bills, household items and travel costs. Anybody who thinks they are eligible, should make contact with the council to discuss their circumstances."

Emergency assistance may be awarded to an applicant who is aged over 16, has their main residence within the East Riding of Yorkshire Council boundary and does not have the resources to meet their or their family's immediate short-term needs
