Gigabit - capable broadband connections offer the fastest and most reliable speeds available, and the Government is committed to a vision of digitally connected Britain. Homes and businesses in rural areas of the UK may be eligible for funding towards the cost of installing gigabit - capable broadband when part of a group scheme. Rural premises with broadband speeds of less than 100Mbps can use vouchers worth £1500 per home and up to £3500 for each small to medium - sized business(SME) to support the cost of installing new fast and reliable connections.

The Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme has the strategic objective of increasing gigabit - capable coverage across the UK. Starting in March 2018, the programme launched the first wave of its programme, designed to encourage broadband service providers to build full - fibre networks in the UK for small to medium - sized businesses and nearby residents when part of a group scheme. The £67m fund was successfully used over two years and has now closed for new applications.


In May 2019, the programme launched its second wave of funding to support the cost of installing gigabit-capable broadband to homes and businesses in rural areas of the UK when part of a group scheme.

### Ingredient

200g butter, softened

250g soft brown sugar, plus some more for sprinkling

2 large eggs

350g self - raising flour

100g rolled oats

1 tablespoon mixed spice

3 - 4 apples, peeled and chopped

1 orange, grated zest and juice (or a little milk)

1 tablespoon cinnamon


Also vapour blasting for alloy motorcycle and car components.

### Steps

#### Cake:

- 1. Heat the oven to 180°c (160°c fan oven) gas mark 4.
- 2. Beat the butter and sugar together till light and pale (use the mixer if you like) and gradually beat in the eggs. Fold in the flour, oatmeal and mixed spice.
- 3. At this point the mixture will be quite dry and crumby. Press half the mixture into a pie dish or shallow baking tin. Top the crumble with the chopped apple, as much as you need to make a layer twice the thickness of your thumb and sprinkle with orange zest and cinnamon.
- In another bowl combine the buttermilk, oil, eggs & vanilla
- **5.** Bake for 30 40 mins until the topping is well risen and firm to the finger. Serve hot or warm.





### **CHURCH CORNER**

Weekly church services have resumed at St. David's and during October they will take place as follows:

Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> October - 6.00 pm Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> October - 10.00 am Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> October - 6.00 pm Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> October - 10.00 am

The service on the 11<sup>th</sup> October will be a sort of a Harvest Festival but not the fully-fledged traditional service 'with all the trimmings'. We are restricted as to how many we can safely accommodate whilst abiding by the current requirements for social distancing and we are also banned from singing. CDs will provide us with our music so it is not all bad! Masks have to be worn by everyone apart from when doing a solo reading. We can however offer thanks collectively for all the crops that have been grown and harvested and for all forms of food that our farmers have worked so hard to produce for our consumption. This year has been particularly difficult for them because of the appalling weather during the winter and early spring and also because of the onset of the coronavirus pandemic and all the consequences of the 'lockdown' that ensued.



Coronavirus should not prevent us from decorating the church appropriately and we would welcome as always any donations of non-perishable foods which we can pass on to the Mission Trinity food bank in Goole. Please mention to any Church Council member if you would like to attend the Harvest service so that we have an idea of numbers and will be able to ensure that everyone has a seat in a 'safe' space.

One of our churchwardens, Janet Rushby, is currently seeking sponsors for a walk that she is shortly to undertake around the 'Howden 20 circular. All the money that she earns by doing this walk will be donated to the funds of St. David's Church. This is by no means the first time that Janet has done this kind of thing for our church and she deserves all our thanks and respect for being prepared to tackle such a challenge once again. Alternative ways of fund-raising for our church are particularly necessary this year because so many of our customary events have had to be cancelled.

Although the children of Airmyn Park Primary won't be able to attend the harvest festival at St David's Church this year, they have been very busy taking part in lots of harvest themed activities. #### School Streets -

#### Improving the Environment around our School for Pupils, Families and Residents

We are excited to announce that Airmyn Park Primary School, in partnership with East Riding of Yorkshire Council and supported by the local Policing team, will be launching the pilot of School Streets once the school return after the Autumn half term holiday in November.

East Riding of Yorkshire Council plan to introduce an Experimental Traffic Regulation Order (ETRO) to restrict traffic at drop-off and pick-up times on the road leading up to the school. During these times, there will be no motor vehicle access, expect for permit holders and exemptions.

This pioneering scheme will restrict vehicle movements at peak times, creating a safer, more pedestrian and cycle friendly environment directly outside the school.

The School Streets scheme will also help make social distancing easier for everyone by creating additional space for people to travel safely to and from school on foot, by scooter or bike, in a near traffic free environment which will help you, our neighbouring residents and school community.

The planned pilot has the full support from our local councillors and parish members. The scheme will be monitored and if successful the Experimental Traffic Regulation Order will be adopted.

School Streets ultimately aims to encourage more of the school community to walk, cycle or scoot by providing extra space and improving the environment leading to our school. We have also secured the use of multiple Park and Stride venues, to assist parents that have to use the car.

The School Streets scheme will also have other benefits:

- By cutting down on traffic and parking pressures outside the school
- Discouraging unnecessary car journeys to school and encourage more sustainable, healthier, active forms of travel
- Make the street outside school a more pleasant environment for all

As a resident located within the restricted zone, you are entitled to apply for a maximum of two free exemption permits per household online, by post or over the phone, to enable you to use your vehicle during these times.

#### How can you help?

We are seeking volunteers to help support the School Streets pilot; to ensure our pupils and families have a safe, enjoyable experience when arriving and leaving our school. The role primarily involves offering advice and guidance to drivers during the restricted times.

If you are keen to help make this scheme a success, please contact the school office for further information and to leave your contact details.

We very much look forward to seeing the launch of School Streets; please help us all by supporting the scheme as much as you can. Thank you for your cooperation and for helping improve the environment outside our school.

Ourselves and East Riding of Yorkshire Council will be sending out more detailed information about the scheme and how to apply for a permit in due course.

# School Streets Volunteers Can You Help?

The school in partnership with East Riding of Yorkshire Council will soon be launching School Streets from Monday 2nd November, which is a pioneering scheme to transform the road outside our school, by restricting traffic.

We are seeking volunteers to help support the School Streets pilot; to ensure our pupils and families have a safe, enjoyable experience when arriving and leaving our school.

The success of School Streets depends on how quickly all of those who may be affected understand and accept the restrictions and how readily they adapt their behaviour. And that, in

turn, depends considerably on the presence of volunteers who can explain what's going on and why, to anyone who asks in a friendly, polite and positive way.

School Streets volunteers will play a key role in helping to communicate the wider benefits of School Streets not just to the school and pupils, but to the local community.

Volunteer support is absolutely critical and is particularly essential at the beginning of the pilot, as people who are used to being able to drive and/or park in the School Streets get used to discovering alternative routes, using the park and stride venues or change their travel habits altogether. Your role will help people to understand how they can help to keep the streets safer, reduce congestion and improving the environment around the school as well as supporting more sustainable ways to travel like walking, scooting and cycling. The primarily role of a School Streets volunteer will inform drivers of the restriction and offering information and guidance, in particular, the location of the park and stride venues. The permanent signs, with details of the access restrictions times to the School Streets zone, will be installed at relevant places. Volunteers will need to explain the reasons for School Streets to passers-by and drivers from the footpath if asked. There will be a foldable information sign and cone to erect and pack away while the restrictions are in place in the morning and

Volunteers, may also need to assist vehicles which either have a permit or are on the exemption list on entering the School Streets zone during the restricted times with the local Policing team offering support.

Onsite training will take place shortly before the launch in line with current Covid-19 guidance in partnership with Humberside Police and East Riding of Yorkshire Council.
