Right now we may not be able to plan and enjoy extravagant gatherings, lavish celebrations or village fetes but what many of us have probably experimented with more than ever, over these last few, quiet months is; baking and cooking and what better thing to make than a chocolate cake! Why not add Ruth's recipe to your collection and give it a whirl? You never know it may be a new favourite in your household, I've heard it was a big hit at previous Church events. Ingredient

Cake:

- 1 ¾ cup plain flour 2 cups sugar ¾ cup cocoa 2 tsp bicarbonate soda 1 tsp baking powder 1 tsp salt 1 cup of buttermilk
- Icing: 56g dark chocolate 56g of milk chocolate 170g unsalted butter
- 1 tsp vanilla
 - 1 ¼ cup icing sugar
 - 1 tbsp coffee
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 2 large eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 cup of hot coffee



Steps

Cake:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°f/180°c/150°c fan/gas 4
- 2. Butter and flour 2 9" round tins
- 3. Sift the flour, sugar, cocoa, bicarbonate of soda, baking powder & salt into a bowl & mix together
- 4. In another bowl combine the buttermilk, oil, eggs & vanilla
- 5. Slowly add the wet ingredients to the dry, then slowly add the coffee
- 6. Pour the batter into the tins & bake for 40 -60 mins, until a cake tester comes out clean
- 7. Cool in the tins for 30 mins, then turn out on a cooling rack & cool completely before icing Icing:
- 1. Break up both chocolate and melt, set aside to cool to room temperature
- 2. Beat the butter for 5 mins until fluffy
- 3. Add vanilla extract & beat for a few mins
- 4. Slowly add in the icing sugar, beat until smooth
- 5. Add in the coffee & the chocolate, mix until blended
- Spread between the 2 cakes



CHURCH CORNER

Resumption of services in Airmyn church

As all readers of this village newsletter will know by now, the coronavirus pandemic put a stop to our regular Sunday services, in common with all other public gatherings, after the Government imposed its nationwide lockdown measures in order to limit the spread of the virus. The last normal service in

Airmyn church was held on the 15th March. Our Vicar, the Rev. Philip Ball, supported by all the members of the Airmyn Parochial Church Council, has now been authorised by the Sheffield Diocesan authorities to resume taking services in the church. The first of these will be on Sunday, the 30th August, commencing at 6.00 pm. It will be very restricted! This service must not include Holy Communion, nor will any hymns be sung. Appropriate music will be provided via CDs instead. The rest of the service will be spoken only. These measures are being taken as a precaution to limit the possibility of the virus being transmitted to others if someone there happened to have, unknowingly, already become infected by it.

Those attending will also find that only a limited number of the pews will be available for them to sit in. The rest have been cordoned off with green ribbons in order to ensure that there is at least two metres of space between individual worshippers.

Christians are not exempt from catching this virus any more than they were exempt from catching the Black Death in 1347 or the Spanish Flu in 1919 - 1920. We can still pray, however, that a vaccine will soon be found that will provide protection for all of us, regardless of religious belief. We can pray for much more besides and, of course, we can give thanks together for the courage, skill and devotion to duty of all those doctors and nurses who have been in the front line fighting to save lives throughout these last six months. Theirs has been a horrendous experience, whilst many of the rest of us have been able simply to do as advised and 'lie low'.

Airmyn church will also be open for use for private prayer by anyone each Sunday from 10.30 am until 11.30 am, although these times may change if we are able to resume having morning services in the not-too-distant future. Any changes to these existing arrangements will be advertised.

Our Vicar has been working very hard throughout the duration of the pandemic by providing full church services each Sunday which can be accessed on You Tube via the St. James' Rawcliffe website. They really are very good indeed and those of you who have not seen any of them so far are encouraged to give them a try.

Countryside Access Team

Public Rights of Way

Public Rights of Way provide rights of access for the public to travel over private land and include footpaths, bridleways and byways both in rural and urban areas.

Ordnance Survey maps are useful but they are not always up to date and you should check your planned route is shown on the Definitive Map (legal record) if at all unsure. You can view the East Riding of Yorkshire's definitive map and use it to plan a route on the *Walking the Riding* page of <u>www.eastridingcoastandcountryside.co.uk</u>. You will also find 100's of suggested routes already listed and information about other ways to access the countryside. You can contact us at <u>countryside.access@eastriding.gov.uk</u>

There are four main types of public right of way (footpaths being the most common) and which ones you are permitted to use will depend on whether you are walking, cycling, riding or using a motor vehicle. Here is a helpful guide.

Public Footpath (yellow arrows) Walkers only

Public Bridleway (blue arrows)

Walkers, cyclists & horse riders



Byway (red arrows) Walkers, cyclists, horse riders, carriage drivers & motor vehicles



Restricted Byway (plum arrows) Walkers, cyclists, horse riders & carriage drivers only

Please do not cycle on public footpaths as this can result in; civil trespass, surface damage, conflict with other users or landowners and could pose a hazard to other users.

Always respect the rights and livelihoods of the landowners whose land you may pass through and keep to the public right of way. You can find helpful advice about using public rights of way and how to behave responsibly in the countryside on the Ramblers webpage and in the Countryside Code. <u>www.ramblers.org.uk</u>
