STEP 1: 8 March

Wraparound childcare.


Stay at home.


Funerals (30), wakes and weddings (6).

29 March


Rule of 6 or two households outdoors. No household mixing indoors.


Outdoor sport and leisure facilities.


Organised outdoor sport allowed (children and adults).


Minimise travel. No holidays.


Outdoor parent & child groups (up to 15 parents).

STEP 2

At least five weeks after Step 1, no earlier than 12 April.


Indoor leisure (including gyms) open for use individually or within household groups.


Rule of 6 or two households outdoors. No household mixing indoors.


Outdoor attractions, such as zoos, theme parks and drive-in cinemas.


Libraries and community centres.


Personal care premises.


All retail.


Outdoor hospitality.


All children's activities, indoor parent & child groups (up to 15 parents).


Domestic overnight stays (household only).


Self-contained accommodation (household only).


Funerals (30), wakes, weddings, receptions (15).



Minimise travel. No international holidays.


Event pilots begin.

STEP 3

At least five weeks after Step 2, no earlier than 17 May.


Indoor entertainment and attractions.


30 person limit outdoors. Rule of 6 or two households indoors (subject to review).


Domestic overnight stays.



Organised indoor adult sport.


Most significant life events (30).


Remaining outdoor entertainment (including performances).


Remaining accommodation.


Some large events (except for pilots) - capacity limits apply.
Indoor events: 1,000 or 50%.
Outdoor other events: 4,000 or 50%.
Outdoor seated events: 10,000 or 25%.


International travel - subject to review.

STEP 4

At least five weeks after Step 3, no earlier than 21 June.

By Step 4, the Government hopes to be able to introduce the following (subject to review):


No legal limits on social contact.


Nightclubs.


Larger events.


No legal limit on all life events.

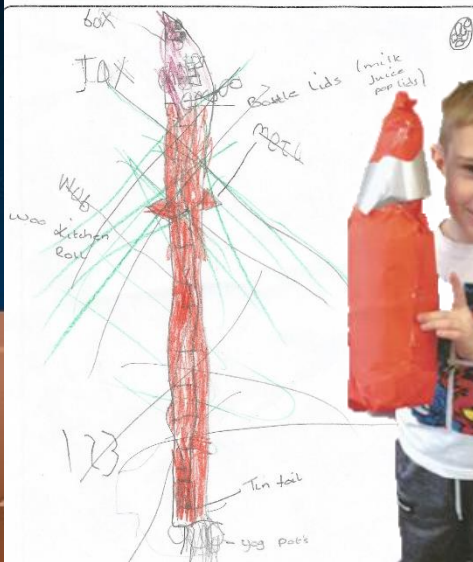

Can you label the important features?



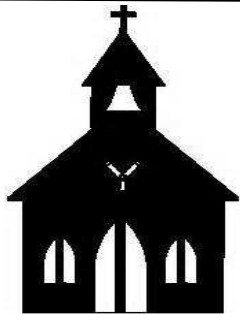
I had a big tin and put it in red paper. I then put tin foil on the bottom of it for fire. I put a cup on it for the pointy nose bit.

CHURCH CORNER

Service times and venues:

Our regular services at St. David's, Airmyn, continue to be affected by the social restrictions imposed because of the coronavirus pandemic but the Prime Minister's explanation of the Government's proposed programme for a phased and very gradual relaxation of the quite austere rules limiting social mixing, which we have all

been living under for almost a year, do give us all some real hope that there is light at the end of the tunnel. It all depends upon the successful expansion of the vaccination programme and upon people continuing to follow the rules concerning social mixing so as to prevent the number of cases of the virus starting to rise again.

We particularly regret that it seems unlikely that we will be able to hold those very special Easter-time services for Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday itself in the normal manner but do watch out on Facebook and elsewhere to see if there are any last-minute changes which enable any of these services to be open to everyone. In the meantime, there will be just one service each Sunday, starting at 10.00 am, coming from one of the three churches in our Benefice, each in its turn, which you will be able to watch them on You Tube using the St. David's, Airmyn, St. Mary's, Hook, or St. James', Rawcliffe websites. Each of the churches has now been provided with a TV monitor via which these services can be broadcast to you in this manner.

There may still be occasional issues with the quality of sound, vision and continuity as we develop this side to our services but we have no doubt that these will soon be resolved.

Sunday 14th March - Hook

Sunday 21st March - Rawcliffe

Sunday 28th March - Airmyn

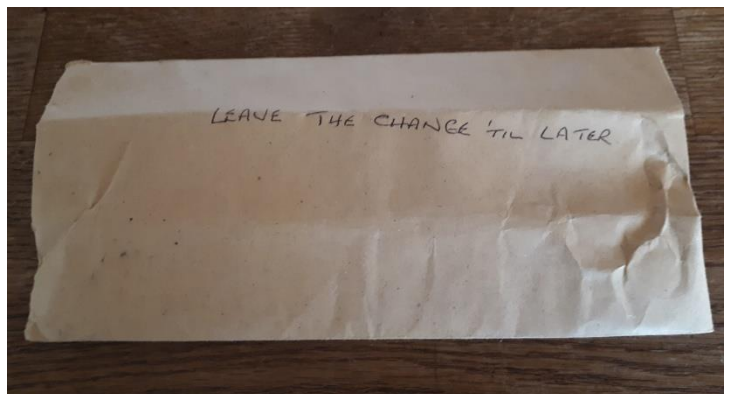

Up-date on work carried out in the village since lockdown in March 2020

As we have all been much more isolated since March 2020, many residents may not be aware of work that has been done in the village by the Parish Council on your behalf and also by Airmyn Community Association at the village hall over the last year or so. There are also plans for some proposed projects in the coming months.

Parish Council items:

Play Area – new fencing on the edge of the car park, which gives greater opportunity to view the area and, therefore, for the safeguarding of our children. Two new benches fitted in the play area.

New bench installed along the footpath on The Crossings to replace a damaged one.

Following the demolition of the village sign by a vehicle at the Glews garage end of the village, this has been re-built.

Work carried out on trees with the help of volunteers.

New defibrillator to be installed on the front of the Old Vicarage Residential Home to replace the one at Airmyn Garage.

Airmyn Community Association (self-funded charity at The Memorial Hall):

New metal fire doors installed.

New Sports Hall lighting.

Sports Hall floor repaired and re-surfaced.

Whole building re-decorated internally.

Hosting essential services for the benefit of the community during Covid restrictions - Post Office; NHS Blood Donations; NHS secondary school vaccinations.

DOG THEFT PRECAUTIONS

DOG THEFT UP 250%

Dog thefts are increasing. A shocking 52% of thefts are from back gardens.

BE AWARE

Always be aware of your surroundings when walking – never walk using your phone so you can react quickly.

Walk routes that you know so that you can make your way home or back to the car quickly if required.

KEEP YOUR DOG SAFE

Make sure your garden is secure – think about fitting an alarm to your gates & don't leave your dog unattended anywhere for any length of time.

STRANGER DANGER

Be aware of who is around whilst walking. Stay away from groups. Be suspicious of people who may have an interest in your dog for who ask questions about them. Never give them your dog's name or any details about the dog.

Never be afraid to ask someone to move away.

YOUR DOG

Your dog must be microchipped & you must check that the microchip details are correctly registered. Keep these details handy. Your dog should always wear an ID tag with your name/number clearly displayed. State if neutered as helpful to deter thieves.

PERSONAL PROTECTION

Think about carrying equipment with you that may help to distract, disarm or help attract attention.

A walking stick, a maglite torch on a wrist strap, a loud rape alarm or a deterrent & identifier spray can help.

Make sure you're wearing bright clothing eg: a Hi Viz jacket.

WHEN WALKING

Never walk alone, vary your walking routes so your route isn't predictable. Only walk your dog off lead if recall is good & they stay close to you. Walk in well lit areas at night. Keep your lead in your non-dominant hand so you can protect with your dominant hand if needed.
