He told the Airmyn News "There are two holes in the river bed and each will need 1000 bags to fill. There are two layers of 500 each. The stone in each bag weighs two tons and comes from Norway as it is non-porous. Each hole was previously mapped out and the driver of the digger has a display linked to a Satellite receiver on shore so that he can see exactly where to place each bag - all hi-tech!"

Re; Shots Annoying Residents

Dear All,

With reference to the article on shots in the village. The Farmers in Airmyn have sown a few fields of oil seed rape. When the rape seed plants sprout and begin to grow it is like caviar to the wood pigeon population. The birds feed in a morning and again in the afternoon. A large flock of wood pigeon can graze a field of rape until the crop fails to recover.

The solution is to scare the birds away. What you are hearing is not gunshots but a gas gun which replicates the sound of a 12 bore shotgun, it automatically fires at random and usually the timer clock is set to fire at peak feeding times. There has been one or two pigeon shooters in the village with the farmers consent, shooting the pigeons in particularly bad areas but these are well away from roads, footpaths and property. Generally speaking the farmers, game and vermin shooters are a very responsible bunch and will all have licenced and insured shotguns. Wood pigeon are classed as vermin and can be shot at any time of the year. The wood pigeons are an enormous problem in the farming industry.

While we are on the subject of farmers, you will have noticed the black piles of what looks like soil in the two fields at the end of the village. What you are looking at is human waste from city centre sewage works. It comes with the complementary smell a bit like a bottle of bleach crossed with a men's urinal. The farmers spread this on fields and the rain will wash it in. It is full of nutrients for the land and feeds the crop. These are the wonderful sounds and smells of living in the countryside.

183/1617 Mobile phones. The chair reminded everyone that these should be switched to silent mode.

184/1617 Co-option of new councillors. None. The resignation notice from the Chair J Peake was read by the Clerk.

185/1617Apologies for absence. None

186/1617 Confirmation of minutes. The minutes of the parish council meeting held on 8 February 2017 were signed as a true and complete record.

187/1617 Declarations of interest. None declared.

188/1617 Information on ongoing issues.

188.1 Bracken Hill. Grant application for the forthcoming year has been submitted. Hare coursing and poaching are recognised by the PCSO. No calls re Bracken Hill have been received by the police. The councillors reported that shooting has been heard on Bracken Hill or on adjacent land.

188.2 Traffic plans from ERYC. No plans have been received to date from ERYC.

188.3 Updates from the Environment Agency re the riverbank work. Email from a resident re work in the riverbed causing vibrations to properties and the Clock Tower. Email sent directly to the project worker at Environment Agency. Road design details are required from ERYC and these will be forwarded to the environment agency. Volunteer flood wardens will work directly with the environment agency and receive training.

188.4 Litter at the motorway roundabout. ERYC will organise this clean up. Request that the litter pick be arranged right up to the Drax roundabout.

188.5 Speed stickers ERYC permission. Clerk to check position with EYRC as concern had been expressed about the stickers being a distraction to drivers rather than stopping speeding.

Trees near the Bowls Club. These trees are now under the ownership of the parish council and the Recent tree cutting has not been approved by the

council. Resolved to write to the two residents and say that no further work must be undertaken by them without the express permission of the Parish Council. No insurance cover is in place for unauthorised residents.

Livestock in the village. A resident is keeping pigs in his garden and has confirmed to the parish council that they are licenced. He also states the RSPCA and Defra know of these pigs. The issue of licensing is an ERYC issue.

Ten days of Prayer

The Church of England's '10 Days of Prayer' event will take place this year from the 25th May until the 4th June and, during this period, St. David's church will be open from 9-00 am until 5-00 pm each day. You are welcome to go and sit in church either by yourself or with others on any of these days to take the chance for a period of private and quiet reflection and prayer. The theme for this year is 'Thy Kingdom come' and there may well be a small display or two in church which will be intended to expand upon this idea. There is a wonderfully peaceful atmosphere within our church, when you have the time to sit down and savour it, and it will perhaps prompt you to reflect upon the generations of Airmyn villagers who have gone before us and who have used and loved this place during the past three hundred and forty years.

The recent concert in the church

During the evening of Saturday, the 15th April, Castleford Male Voice Choir gave an excellent concert in St. David's church. There were twenty-eight singers in the choir and more than sixty people in the audience and this made for a most enjoyable evening. The choir's programme included British and American items in roughly equal measure, ranging from 'Bring him home' (from Les Miserables) and 'Sailing' (Rod Stewart) to a medley of Al Johnson hits and, finally, 'An American Trilogy', which unites three 19th century American folk songs, 'Dixie', 'Battle Hymn of the Republic' and 'All My Trials'. Also, most appropriately for Easter Saturday, there were Christian items such as 'There is a green hill far away' and 'Morte Christe' (When I survey the wondrous cross'), so the sanctity of the church was acknowledged and respected. The building is very good acoustically and lends itself well to such occasions. The concert, which was well advertised, was organised by the Airmyn branch of the Women's Institute and their members provided and served a good supper during the interval. All the proceeds, after the deduction of costs, went into their funds. They would welcome a few new members, incidentally.
