FULL STEAM AHEAD FOR THE RENOVATIONS

Following the grant from the Two Rivers Community Fund, the renovation of the kitchen at Airmyn Memorial Hall has got underway, with a deep clean ready to accommodate the new cooker and warming oven, the latter having arrived a couple of weeks ago. The renovation is one part of the plans to update the Hall and make it fit for purpose in the 21st century. Other initiatives such as new low-cost LED lighting, a greener (and more cost-effective) heating system and rainwater harvesting are also being investigated. The rationale behind the update is not just a need to replace and repair, but also to make the Hall more attractive to paying customers, so that it can become self-funding in a couple of years' time, and allow the ACA to run free or low-cost community events.

After the electrics are tested (around about now), the new units will be ordered and are due to be installed at the beginning of July, so the new kitchen should be fully installed by August. As well as new unit doors (the carcasses

still being in good condition) and worktops, the larder fridge freezer will be replaced, and an additional under-counter fridge provided so that drinks and items such as milk for teas and coffees can be stored safely and to hand.

The ACA are currently investigating the best method for replacing the floor, and this will be laid after the kitchen is repainted. Other improvements will be new crockery/cutlery (as money allows). Further ahead, it is envisaged that the toilets will undergo a much-needed facelift. All offers of help/cash/elbow grease are always welcome!



THE PEOPLE HAVE SPOKEN...

The findings of the recent questionnaire regarding installation of CCTV in the village were presented to the council. 350 dwellings received a questionnaire for completion. The result was 66 votes for, with 15 against. Neighbourhood Watch are to be contacted and advised of a potential donation of £2500 from the Police and Crime Commissioner.

A shortfall would exist against the quote for CCTV of approximately £6000. The meeting noted that other quotes may be cheaper and further quotes needed to be obtained. The CCTV would only register vehicle number plates and not record people. Cllr Fox has made a commitment to the fund raising for the village CCTV. A query was raised as to how much it would cost to run a CCTV system.

Councillor Caroline Fox will contact the Police and Crime Commissioner to ascertain whether the funding could still be accessed and spent on security locks for vulnerable residents or other security measures for the village, should the CCTV project not go ahead. All agreed that there was no real haste, so that fund raising events could be held. Thanks were expressed by the Chair, Jane Peake, to Councillor Fox for her efforts in raising this issue.

SORRY SLIPPAGE SAGA SATISFACTORILY SOLVED-?

Parishioners, especially those living near the bank, will be forgiven in the next few weeks for breaking into a wry smile when a leaflet from our other favourite governmental organisation (the first being, of course the ERYC), pops through our doors. After much correspondence with the Environment Agency, and the sterling efforts of individuals such as David Galloway, to get them to take action to conserve the integrity of the flood defences, they have published a leaflet to inform us all of their current flurry of activity -proof that, actually, they DO care about us, in spite of previous appearances to the contrary!

They admit that, "In mid February 2016 a resident of Airmyn alerted us to a foreshore slip downstream of the Beverley Memorial Clocktower at Airmyn, East Yorkshire." They report, "The Airmyn Foreshore Slip was initially around 150 m long and 0.5m high. Over the next few days the crack grew longer and higher – to around 1m high in places. Upon further inspection, we have also identified signs of instability and river bank erosion upstream, towards Airmyn Garage and the slipway at the far end of High Street. We are now working with our consultants and contractors to restore the damage that has occurred on the Aire,

and other rivers across Yorkshire during this very wet winter."

We won't spoil the excitement of receiving the newsletter for you by publishing all of it here, but we can tell you that the Environment Agency's Field Team are monitoring the bank at least twice a week. They have also commissioned ongoing bank and river bed surveys to check for any movement, although the greatest danger of flooding has now passed. The river bed surveys have shown a large scour hole in the river bed running alongside the bank slip downstream of the clock tower, so this will be the focus of initial reparatory works. This is believed to have been the cause of the bank slip , along with the extremely wet winter of 2015/16 which led to saturation of the embankments.

As the interaction of the river flows and tides at the site are complex, the EA's consultants are carrying out a detailed study of the clocktower slip site and the wider area, so that a long-term tabilisation scheme can be put in place during the course of this year. They say they are confident that the remaining foreshore is sufficiently wide enough and stable enough to leave sufficient time to design the repair works. Although these are termed "Emergency



Works", this is purely to ensure that funding for the works is prioritised, and there is no danger at present.

BRACKEN HILL

The Trust for Conservation Volunteers' project, which has been granted £10, 670, is now set to commence, and will be co-ordinated by Leah Hallas from TCV

They would like to base the whole project around improving the woodland for both wildlife and the local community. With this in mind they propose that the best way forward for this phase of funding is to create a woodland walk using natural materials on site (dead wood) with a number of glades that can be used for various activities. This will include selective thinning in places, the removal of dead wood, creation of open glade areas (for bulb planting), rubbish removal and making the area safe , as there are a large number of dead overhanging branches throughout the woodland.

The Trust will then hold a number of community events to showcase the woodland and the project based around various activities.

There was another good attendance at the latest Open Day organised by the Coach-House Committee on 21 May. For once we were very lucky with the weather. After early morning rain and a fairly dire forecast for the rest of the day, the sun surprised everyone by coming out and staying with us for the rest of the event. We were able to take down the four gazebos 'in the dry' at the end and pack them away immediately, without having to hang them out to dry for a day or two afterwards. We were doubly fortunate because just one hour after we had dismantled everything, the heavens opened and the promised rain lashed down for an hour or two.

There were a great many volunteers who helped with the setting-up and the taking-down of all the equipment, and a good number of bakers who worked hard to prepare an excellent range of food that was enjoyed both at the event or later at home. Grateful thanks are offered to them all. They were a good team and everyone helped each other. The event raised about £375 on the day and there will be a further £145 for the Committee's funds when all 59 numbers for the latest Bonus Ball competition are sold.

The fully-detailed and final plans for the renovation of the coach house were on display at the Open Day and we are hopeful of the work being undertaken early next year. It is important that we raise some money by our own efforts, because it will count in our favour when we shortly come to apply for grants for the project from national and regional funding agencies.

We expected to have the Coach House renovated and equipped as a small community facility long before now, of course. Only the Committee members would be able to tell you just how frustrating a time in terms of progress they have had since the Committee was formed in January, 2012. Every possible agency that could delay us has done so, the latest being the Sheffield Diocesan Advisory Committee, which, while being thoroughly in favour of the project in principle, is asking for far more detail of what is proposed for the inside of the building than even the East Riding of Yorkshire Council's Planning Department required. We need evidence from these people authorising the project to go ahead. They will be wanting to know what we are serving in our sandwiches next and what brands of tea and coffee we are proposing to use! Watch this space!

ACA update

Cllr Thompson reported that the 2015-16 ACA accounts will be discussed at the next meeting. The kitchen is to be updated in line with the grant form submitted. The weather had prevented the use of the football pitch so the team using it have trained in the Hall instead. The Easter fund raising events were well supported. Further events include a race night in April, a qiz in May and a family dance and BBQ in June.

Mr Jacques the voluntary Clock Winder has taken a course and gained the relevant certificate. He hassigned the Parish Council Health and Safety policy.

Matters raised by the public

- Prices for events need to be included on posters and in the Airmyn News.
- The new parish council was congratulated for its efforts in the past year.
- A request was made to honour the late Tim Richardson in recognition of his role as President of the Playing Fields committee via a plaque or event. This will be looked at by the ACA.

Presentation of Bracken Hill project by Mr I Jakulis, TCV Area Manager

The recently-awarded grant of £10,607 will be used for 10 woodland management days which will enhance and maintain the area of Bracken Hill. Skills such as bushcraft willb e taught through five community engagement events. There will be additional winter planting of native bulbs and shrub species. It was pointed out that the back of the site is dangerous but TCV will conduct a survey, and a metal hinged barrier will secure the site. A small area at the front of the site for two mini buses will allow visitor parking. TCV will insure for public liability.

- 16/00659/PLF: Glews Garage Rawcliffe. This is a large extension to the current retail area. Resolved no objections or views for this council.

- Date for Annual Parish Meeting agreed for 11 May 7pm; invitations to be sent out. The Annual Council meeting will follow at 7.30pm followed by the normal PC meeting.
- Grass contracts will be advertised potentially in July. Two contracts will expire next year.
- No applications were made to Goole Fields for funding by the 31 March deadline.
- Resolved to look at Health and Safety actions after recent inspection later in the year.
- The Airmyn and Goole Drainage Board are to inspect the dykes.
- The Environment Agency have commenced work to remove willows along the foreshore.
- The dangerous lamp post in Airmyn Road has now been removed by ERYC and will be replaced.

If everyone is registered, it will give the emergency Street Co-ordinators extra time to assist with requests for particular help, rather than unnecessarily going from house to house to alert occupants of a flood warning.
